Every church can be intentionally intergenerational in all of its ministry and faith formation experiences. To become a life-giving spiritual community we can:

- cultivate relationships across generations
- include all generations in worship
- engage all ages and generations together in learning
- encourage a community of prayer
- involve all ages and generations in service and mission to the world

Intergenerational ministry is not a new program to be added on to what the congregation is already doing, rather it can be effectively woven into the fabric of current ministry.
